
Visits

When we arrived at the theatre the children's jaws dropped and mouths were wide open at the magical sight of all the lights, sounds and velvety red seats. The show was mesmerized. The show was brilliant and the children joined in with the famous lines and phrases from the story. There was a real sense of magic in the air. Remembering World War 2...

Year Six visited Eden Camp after studying World War 2 in history curriculum. The children were able to see first-hand what it was like during the war. They walked down a boarded up street, saw a Prisoner of War camp and experienced the sights and sounds of the Blitz. The impact of the war was greatly felt by all children at the end when we paid our respects in the Chapel of Rest. When we returned to school, we weighed out food to see how much was received during rationing, and we were evacuated to the countryside away from our class. We have also created some fantastic poems, stories and diary entries from our History work.



Cross Country

On Tuesday 9th November, children from across TVED came together for a very successful Cross-Country competition. There were six different races, with a total of over 120 children taking part, which was amazing to see. All the children who took part did the Trust and their Academies very proud, with some very talented runners from all year groups. The overall points total came out as 1st to Pennyman, 2nd to Brambles, 3rd to Dormanstown and 4th to Wilton. A huge thanks to all the staff within the Trust that helped, supported and made it possible for the children to take part in what was truly a fantastic and enjoyable morning. We were also proud of our Year 6 race marshalls, who did an amazing job of directing the runners and giving them lots of encouragement.



Harvest Festival

We had Harvest Festival assemblies in the academy which were enjoyed by all the children and led by Miss Riley. We were so grateful for all the amazing donations of food and other household goods which we took to the local Footprints Food Bank.



Year 4 Science Show

As part of their Science topic, Electricity, children in Year 4 took part in a science show with a wide variety of enjoyable activities. Children were able to witness incredible experiments carried out by 'Professor Brainstorm'. Through creating a human chain that allowed electricity to pass through and light up a bulb, children were amazed to learn that humans are conductors of electricity. In class, Year 4, have continued their work on electricity through creating circuits and carrying out various experiments. Year 4 children can speak confidently about the uses of electricity and how an electrical circuit works.

The Nursery and Reception children have been very busy making toys, wrapping presents and role playing in their Elves Workshops. They even had a quiet story area to enjoy their Christmas stories.

Sporting Success

It has been lovely to see the children attending sports competitions again this half term and we have had some fantastic performances in ALL the competitions we have entered. The Y5/6 boys produced some excellent attacking play in the football competition, progressing to the Championship Competition, just missing out on a Semi Final Place. We took 33 children to the cross-country competition, in tough conditions all the children ran their best and we had 6 top 20 finishes with Mercy T, Lily F and Jenson K finishing in the top 10 in their races to qualify for the Tees Valley Finals. We also took a team of children from across the academy to the TVEd Cross Country competition at Dormanstown. The children once again proved how determined, committed and resilient they were, coming back to the academy as the overall winners. Well done to them and all the children across TVEd!

In the Tag Rugby competitions, the Y5 and 6 girls team played some wonderful rugby scoring some excellent tries, finishing 4th in a very tough group. The Y5 and 6 boys' team were in a very competitive group, they played some excellent attacking Rugby and defending brilliantly throughout, finishing joint 2nd in the group progressing onto the semi-finals on try difference. In a pulsating end to end game the boys just missed out on the final losing to a very solid Berwick Hills team 6 - 4.

We will remember them

On Thursday 11th November the whole of Pennyman stood still for two minutes both in school and at Middlesbrough Cenotaph.

Due to this Year celebrating 100 years of the Poppy here at Pennyman we thought we would do something different. As well as children completing activities in classes, children made plastic bottle poppies and watched a presentation from Durham Light Infantry all about this period. The children heard stories from the time, met soldiers from wars and got to see real life artefacts soldiers had. All classes enjoyed this experience and it brought their learning to life.

In addition to this, 10 Year 6 children were lucky enough to be invited to visit Middlesbrough Cenotaph to represent the school. Here the children added our plastic bottle poppies to a display, laid poppy crosses on behalf of the school and celebrated with local councillors and the mayor. Once again, the children enjoyed this experience and represented Pennyman brilliantly.



Reliving the Romans!

The year four classes were treated to a feast of Roman facts to kick start their learning on this significant period of our history. It was a wonderful experience for the children to meet 'a real roman' and learn from him what it was like to be a soldier, what life was like and how the roman's fought with the Spartans.

Our children could not believe that buildings built by the romans all those years ago are still standing today in the United Kingdom. The children thoroughly enjoyed the day and this provided a springboard for their learning.



Year 6 World War 2 Day

To end their WW2 topic in style, Year 6 celebrated with a World War 2 theme day. The children looked fantastic in their costumes, ranging from soldiers to land girls and evacuees to teachers. Throughout the day, the children took part in a whole range of activities. The day began with an air raid siren where the children were fully immersed and followed the 'black out' rules. They then cracked Morse Code messages, learnt the Lindy Hop dance, created Spitfires and played war time playground games. They ended the day with afternoon tea served from original china tea pots, cups and saucers. The children all thoroughly enjoyed the day and will remember it for many years to come.
