The children enjoyed using Scratch to design their own version of a story that they have loved reading this year.







Diamond Jubilee

Brambles celebrated the Queen's Jubilee in true Brambles style. We started the day with a whole school assembly to celebrate our Jubilee Crown competition. Children across the whole academy were invited to make a Crown at home to bring into school. It was a difficult decision trying to pick winners however, each year group had a very worthy winner, each winning a prize. The children decorated the corridors with bunting, paper chains and made flags. Each year group celebrated a decade from the Queen's reign working together to create a special poster. At lunchtime, we had a whole school outdoor picnic with music playing.

The atmosphere was fantastic – especially when all of the children joined in singing 'Sweet Caroline'. In the afternoon we split the time so everyone had a turn of playing games on the field – mini golf, ring toss and limbo to name a few – then a craft session making a carriage for the Queen, a lolly stick soldier and an Andy Warhol inspired collage of the Queen. Each child in school received a very special keepsake book and button badge to remember the day. The children thoroughly enjoyed the learning that took place and the celebrations to finish the half term.

James Webb Telescope Workshop

Pupils in Year 5 and 6 had the opportunity to work with an artist and a scientist! The children were able to share prior knowledge of space and their understanding of telescopes before creating their art. They learnt lots of new science vocabulary and were lucky enough to ask the scientist some questions about her work.





Walk to School Week

Many of our pupils come to school on the bus, but this did not stop us recognising the importance of exercise and being outdoors! All children walked around the outdoor environment of school each day and counted the steps and miles they completed.

The staff and children at Discovery had a day of royal activities and then everyone came together for a finale tea party on the playground. All children had learnt to sing and sign the National Anthem and when they all came together to perform it at the end of the day, it really was a truly memorable occasion.

Redcar Lifeboats

As part of our local study in history, 4HM explored the background of the lifeboat in Redcar including, the oldest surviving lifeboat the 'Zetland'. Children then took time making comparisons with today's lifeboat service and the creation of the RNLI. We had the opportunity to meet the first lady to be part of the Redcar lifeboat. The children were in awe of her, and this even inspired some children to want to become a crew member. All of Year 4 finished the topic understanding how vital the lifeboat service is to a small coastal town such as Redcar, by the study of historical events through to present day.



I loved the topic of lifeboats because the RNLI is really important as it has saved lots of lives at sea.



It was good to learn about the engines of the boats and how they were powered, as well as learning about safety at sea.

World of Work Event

In June, Year 6 entered the world of work at the rather plush, new headquarters of AV Dawson, a logistics firm, based in Middlesbrough. The sessions included: surveying the scene, meeting and greeting their aptly named robot, exploring what was on offer in the Tees Valley, thinking about and considering their future, especially with regard to employment and a career.

Working collaboratively, the children were able to practise and develop: a wider understanding of the local area; an understanding of which companies are based in the area; an understanding of what different companies do and what roles they have as well as cultural capital focussed on agency in the local workplace.

The children were enthusiastic participants, who showed great resilience and patience in keeping on track and completing the various tasks, despite some technical issues at times - definitely some engineers of the future! Two special bonuses too: tracking and watching a ship docking and a tour of the beautiful building and surrounding area, courtesy of unofficial tour guide, Mr Stogdale.





Dreaming of Australia

As part of their Geography topic, Year 2 looked at the job of a travel agent and shared travel brochures to support the production of leaflets about Australia. The children worked collaboratively to research more information about Australia and why people visit there. Then they created a leaflet to present to the rest of the class on some of the reasons to visit Australia. The children thoroughly enjoyed this project and had an Oracy debate on whether they would like to visit the country or not.

Joe Cornish Art

5H enjoyed researching the artist Joe Cornish who is a successful nature photographer, mainly based in the North East. He is skilled in using perspective and the contrast between light and dark to create mood in photographs. After our research, it was time for 5H to create their own photographs in nature that were inspired by his work. To do this we spent an afternoon in Fox Rush Woods. We did get rained on – but this just made our photos better! The children fully enjoyed this experience and have been asking when they can next do photography again.





EYFS visits in our local area

Reception visited Newham Grange Farm to learn all about farming. We had a tour around the large livestock and found out lots of interesting facts about the animals. We also stroked and held the guinea pigs, rabbits and tortoise. The children had a great time in the discovery room, observing the bees, and we even had fun milking a cow. Later we played mini golf and had fun at the park. It was an amazing day that we will never forget.









Nursery had a very busy day exploring nature and discovering minibeasts at Hardwick Park. At the park, we had so much fun searching for bugs and looking close up at them in our special bug catchers. The visit was topped off with a fantastic workshop all about 'The Hungry Caterpillar'. We made butterflies out of natural materials and had to search for the food from the story that was hidden in the woods. Nursery walked over 8,000 steps but everyone had the biggest of smiles.

Jubilee Celebrations

We had a wonderful week of activities to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The children undertook lots of activities linked to the history of the royal family, and we had a whole school project of making portraits of the queen in different media in art which we used to make an impressive display.

They started off by learning about how some materials are soluble or insoluble in water, and how some have reversible or irreversible changes - heating and cooling chocolate and eggs was fun! But don't worry they didn't eat them together! They then had a lesson all about magnets, learning about how they repel or attract. Mrs Newbold is lucky to have children who are mazing at science.









Animex Academy

The children in Y2 were given the opportunity to take part in a day of coding in association with the Animex Academy conference and Teesside University. At the start of the day, the children were asked to develop a story and create a plan based on 'The Day the Crayons went on Holiday'. Their ideas were wonderful. We had crayons going to Egypt to visit the pyramids, taking rockets to space and visiting Disneyland. Afterwards, the children turned their plans into Scratch Jnr projects where they wrote the code to add movement, transitions, speech and sound effects. They created some amazing projects and throughout the day, their work was shared with other schools taking part via a live blog. It was a fantastic experience and the children worked incredibly hard.







Making History

This term, the children in year 4 went on a trip to Ormesby Hall as part of their Pennyman Family topic. They helped the National Trust celebrate their 60th anniversary of being at Ormesby Hall. The children had a guided tour of the house, got a chance to look at the gardens and then designed their own individual squares that will be sewn together to make a quilt and displayed in the museum to commemorate 60 years.





Viking experience

To support the children's learning about Vikings and Anglo-Saxons, a local historian and actress was invited in to the academy to work with year 3 children to bring their learning to life. Through the use of artefacts, acting and role-play the children learnt about Viking life; their jobs and trades with other countries as well as their ship building and weaponry. All children had the opportunity to handle the artefacts as well as grinding flour using an authentic mill stone. The children thoroughly enjoyed the day and made learning memories to last throughout their education. What a great experience they had meeting Sif the Viking trader!





WILTON PRIMARY ACADEMY

Early Years

Mrs Barron's class have been making their own farmyards and learning the names of farm animals and their babies. This was then followed by an exciting trip to Tweddle Farm, where they got to meet, feed and learn about lots of different animals.

The children read the story of The Little Red Hen. Nursery could retell the story using actions and the class received a note from the hen asking for their help to make bread. They took delivery of some wheat to grind and wrote back to the hen. Making some bread was hard work with all the kneading, but it was delicious!

The class had a surprise delivery of some eggs. The children guessed what they thought would hatch out of them and two days later four gorgeous fluffy ducklings hatched. The children enjoyed caring for them and learning all about them.









Year 1 and 2

In computing Mrs Barron's class have been learning how to create an algorithm to move a sprite in a computer program. The children had to practice giving clear instructions to each other to move around the classroom using the directional vocabulary of right, left, quarter and half turn. Once they did that they had to program the sprite and then debug any errors.

They studied local artist McKenzie Thorpe and created their own paintings using a variety of materials such as paint, charcoal and pastels. After sending some of the pictures to McKenzie, they were really proud when McKenzie tweeted a response to their pictures.


In music, Mr Nixon has been teaching the children how to follow musical notation and use tuned instruments to copy and repeat rhythms. They can now play Twinkle Twinkle by following the notes on the screen.

Year 3 and 4

In Geography, Miss Norton's class have been looking at how the North East has changed, particularly since the Roman times and how, in fact, we still have evidence of their archaeology close to us. They then linked this to their writing, where they created some persuasive leaflets for visitors who may come to our local area.

In R.E, we learnt about how colour is significant in different religions and we also discussed how different colours make us feel.

The children received notification from the 'ROAD to RIAT' challenge, that the children had previously completed, to state that they had been chosen as regional winners! As part of their prize the children won £150 and, with this money lots of STEM games and activities were purchased for all classes in the academy.





WILTON PRIMARY ACADEMY



Year 5 and 6

All children successfully completed their swimming lessons, with the majority swimming at least 25m. They learnt how to rescue somebody if they were in trouble and how to get them out of the pool and shout for help.

A World At Work session held at AV Dawson was an interesting day for the children. They explored the occupations available in the Middlesbrough area and looked at programming robots. They were impressed with the views over the River Tees.

Year 6 also attended a transition workshop, run by Head Start, to explore their feeling around moving up to secondary school. They looked at whether they were nervous, excited or not really bothered about aspects such as a larger school, new teachers, new lessons and lunch! (The really important one!)

In preparation for the end of term, all of the children have been very busy designing a T-shirts to reflect their time at WPA (particularly poignant for year 6). This is their art topic looking at the impact of costumes and how they are created. The children have been recording what they remember throughout their school life and have created T-shirts using various media including pens, sewing, applique etc.











Queen's Diamond Jubilee

We thoroughly enjoyed our learning and celebrating for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

All classes completed some work in class, including learning lots of facts about our monarch, her role and why the monarchy is important. As part of the jubilee celebrations, some children designed, made and ate some very beautiful cakes fit for a Queen!

The children used different coloured icing to manipulate and create their designs. They read a factual book and text about her life and this resulted in lots of interesting and thought provoking questions being asked. In art, Miss Norton's class created sketches of some of the Queen's many homes and then painted these using some previously learned techniques. The week ended with a Street Party which unfortunately had to be held inside due to the weather. However, it was a lovely afternoon to celebrate with our families and the community.















Business, Industry and Enterprise Institute @ TVED

We are proud of the communities that we serve. But did you know that they are built on a rich history of industry and enterprise?

On your way to our academies, you may catch a glimpse of the Transporter Bridge without realising that the prototype for all bridges like this were designed by Charles Smith in 1973 in Hartlepool.

Film industry pioneer, Ridley Scott, is from the North East and based the opening scenes of Blade Runner on the former ICI plant at Wilton.

Henry William Ferdinand Bolckow (1806-1878) was a Victorian industrialist and Member of Parliament, acknowledged as being one of the founders of modern Middlesbrough.

Middlesbrough born Maud Mary Chadburn CBE (1868 –1957), was one of the earliest women in the United Kingdom to pursue a career as a surgeon. She also co-founded the South London Hospital for Women and Children in 1912 with fellow surgeons.

Middlesbrough MP Ellen Cicely Wilkinson (1891 –1947) was a politician who served as Minister of Education from July 1945 until her death.



Middlesbrough born Sir Liam Joseph Donaldson (1949-) is a British doctor. He was formerly the Chief Medical Officer for England, being the 15th occupant of the post since it was established in 1855.

These historical figures, innovators and agents of change were shaped by the Teesside communities in which they served. We believe that industry, business and enterprise continue to define our communities. We know that our children are the future innovators and agents of change in Teesside and beyond.

As part of our Institute, children will be learning both in the classroom and in other locations linked to our business, industry and enterprise partners about all the amazing opportunities they have open to them.

Industrial Cadets is a kite mark for schools and students seeking valuable and exciting STEM opportunities (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics).

Across the trust, pupils worked with Industrial Cadets to offer active learning experiences in STEM related careers, giving them pupils the opportunity to gain knowledge and exposure that will help them make decisions about their future. Through each workshop, students engaged


with STEM subject areas whilst taking part in hands on activities. The day was designed to excite and enlighten our students on how STEM is fun, interesting, and results in a rewarding career.
