Reading with the community

In April, Brambles Primary Academy held a meeting for Year 2 parents to discuss the importance of Early Reading and Phonics along with providing information about the upcoming Phonics Screening Check. The meeting explained to parents about the implementation of Read Write Inc (RWI) in the academy and how to support with this at home. Reading books were also shared to promote home reading and its impact on the children's development with their early reading. We have invested heavily in Read Write Inc reading books to support with this which will have a huge impact on the children's implementation of sounds and fluency when reading, including reading faster with pace and punctuation as well developing a child's understanding of the stories they are reading.

Reception reading meeting

On Friday 4th March, the Reception team and children invited parents into school for a Teddy Bear's Picnic. We had an overwhelming response, with 26 parents joining us to share a story and snacks. During the week, the children became authors, writing their own stories, which they then shared with their parents at the picnic. Staff were able to speak with parents about the importance of reading, how parents could support their child at home and the weekly reading chart that we complete on a Friday in school.

The morning was a fantastic opportunity to show parents how much we love reading and to open our amazing new library to everyone. We had some wonderful comments from parents who thoroughly enjoyed the reading morning - and the teddy bear biscuits we made! We are excited to say that from this meeting we have seen an increase in the number of children reading at home.





Breakfast club

The Greggs Foundation Trust continues to sponsor our Breakfast Club which has recently increased in numbers. Brambles now welcomes 88 children each morning. Providing breakfast gives our children the nutrition to fuel them for the day ahead.

The children are able to mix with peers and staff and set themselves up both physically and mentally for their time in class.

The Foundation also allows us at Brambles to support families through the hardship grant programme providing white goods, household items, uniform, and supermarket vouchers as well as giving us the opportunity to make up and distribute food hampers for a number of our families.



The Nest

The Nest is a newly developed space within school that is used to support the mental health and well-being of our children. The Nest was developed through a grant awarded by HeadStart to support our children with daily school life. We use this as a safe space for children to go when they are feeling overwhelmed and for emotional well-being interventions to take place. During dinner time, it is used by siblings who play games that support their social and emotional development, and throughout the day, our ELSA teacher delivers interventions to children across the school. It is important for us to support our children's mental health and well-being to ensure we are allowing meaningful learning to take place.

Living eggs

All the pupils from nursery to year 6 thoroughly enjoyed watching the life cycle of a chick from egg to being born, and watching them grow. The children held the chicks and talked about how to be gentle and care for them. They have now been homed at a local allotment and the children love seeing photos of them and hearing about how they are getting bigger.





Inclusion Quality Mark Award

We have recently had our annual assessment visit for the Inclusion Quality Mark Centre of Excellence Award. Our assessor met groups of pupils and spent time in the playground and in assembly. Pupils impressed our assessor with their enthusiasm and she commented on how 'pupils were deeply engaged in their learning and wider experiences'.


HeadStart

HeadStart

As an academy, we work with HeadStart to build academic resilience. Twelve, Year 4 and 5 children have recently completed their bronze award as HeadStarters in which they have explored feelings, learnt coping strategies, looked at stigma, discussed ways to build connections and the effects loneliness can have on people. The children thoroughly enjoyed each session and are now equipped to support their peers.



Litter Picking

Our Year 6 Junior Leadership Team took part in a litter pick supported by the local Councillor and the Community Development Officer to help make the local area a cleaner place for all. The children were keen to participate and proud to support the community they live in.



Mellors Menus

Mellors, our catering company, produced specific menus and food linked to Chinese New Year, World Book Day, School Meals Day and Easter. This allowed the children the opportunity to try some new dishes and made the links to these special events in school.

This training really enhanced our lunchtime offer and allowed for a wider range of activities available for the children to engage in. 
'Eggcellent' Raffle
